## ***Get Ready For Your Leap Of Faith!***

*“Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.” Hebrews 11:1*

Indiana Jones’ father is dying of a gunshot wound. The brave explorer has wound his way through a labyrinthine tomb in search of the one relic, the Holy Grail, that would save him. Figuring out each clever riddle, he ends up at a doorway to oblivion. Before him, a gap too far to jump across, and below him a bottomless pit, a fall into which would surely kill him. For those who have seen the movie, Indie says it to himself and knows it to be true. “It’s a leap of faith.” He has to jump, and trust that the thing he does that will kill him is actually the very thing that will save him, and his father. So, he closes his eyes—and leaps!

Have you ever taken a leap of faith? Have you ever jumped out on a limb, knowing it shouldn’t hold you, but believing that it would? We live on faith all day, every day. Faith that the earth will keep turning and gravity will keep us on the ground. Faith that breathing in will give us the oxygen we need at every moment. Faith that if the airplane is going fast enough, the wings will lift it off the runway. But these aren’t really leaps of faith because we’ve observed these things over and over, and some trust is built up that things will keep going as they have in the past.

No, a leap of faith is trusting, as the writer of Hebrews reminds us, in something unseen. A conviction of belief for something we haven’t observed firsthand. It was a leap of faith for Daniel to brave the lion’s den. It was a leap of faith for Abraham to raise a knife to his son Isaac as a sacrifice by God’s command. It was a leap of faith for the Centurion to trust that his servant was healed on the word of Jesus alone.

Encountering the challenges of 2021 will be another leap in our faith!

God desires and blesses leaps of faith. He is glorified in those who trust in Him wholeheartedly, with nothing else to go on other than God is Who He says He is. After Jesus’ resurrection, Thomas wanted to see Jesus before he believed that He had been raised from the dead. And He did! When Jesus saw him, He said, *“Have you believed because you have seen Me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed”* (John 20:29).

Are you willing to take a leap of faith into 2021? Are you willing to trust God on something, sight unseen?

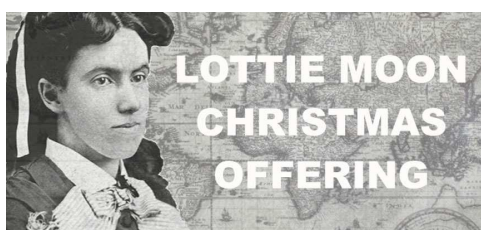

### ***The Last Impression...***

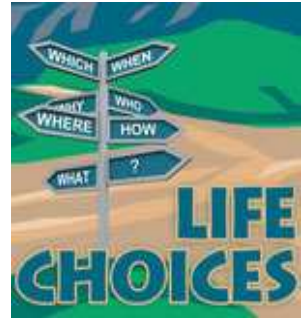
As another year rolls around, you may want to check out these signs that you are getting older:

## ***What We Think***

There is much we cannot control that takes place around us. We surely cannot control the weather, and we cannot control the things others may do or say. But, we do have the power to control ourselves! Every moment of every day, each of us makes decisions – choices – about how we will proceed in life.



Much of our life's direction is determined by the sum total of these daily decisions!

In all of our choices, the area that is perhaps most difficult to control, but at the same time is the most important, is the choice of what we think! There is a saying that goes like this –

*Watch your thoughts, for they become words.*

*Watch your words, for they become actions.*

*Watch your actions, for they become habits.*

*Watch your habits, for they become your character.*

*Watch your character, for it becomes your destiny.*

*What we think, we become.* Through the years, this phrase has been attributed to many individuals. Regardless of who originally penned these words, they are so true. In fact, they are biblical! Proverbs 4:23 tells us to *"be careful how you think; your life is shaped by your thoughts."*



## ***Harvest What You Plant***

Pretend you've come to visit me. I'm working in my greenhouse. (Neither my house nor my thumb is green, but let's pretend.) It's the perfect spot for flowers and fruit. You've always thought I was a bit crazy, but what I do next removes all doubt. I strip seeds off weeds – crab grass, grass burrs. You can't believe what you've just seen.

"I thought you wanted a greenhouse full of flowers and fruit!" you say.

"I do," I answer.

You ask, "Then don't you think you ought to plant flower seeds and fruit seeds?"

My foolish response, "Do you have any idea how much those seeds cost? No thanks, I'm taking the cheap and easy route."

Think for a moment of your heart as a greenhouse. Consider your thoughts as seed. Some become flowers. Others weeds. Sow seeds of hope and enjoy optimism. Sow seeds of doubt and expect insecurity. Galatians 6:7 says, *"People harvest only what they plant."* It starts in your heart. Pray that prayer today... *"create in me a clean heart Lord"*.

## ***Taking Root: Be Grounded***

In 2004 in Sweden, researchers found the oldest known living plant on earth, a 13-foot-tall Norway spruce. The visible part of the tree - the part above ground - is about 600 years old; but the tree's roots predate Abraham.

In fact, scientists believe they go back thousands of years. Whenever a stem or trunk dies, a new one emerges from the root stock, and that's what gives the tree its incredible longevity.

In Job 14:7-9 we read, "There is hope for a tree, if it is cut down, that it will sprout again, and that its tender shoots will not cease. Though its roots may grow old in the earth, and its stump may die in the ground, yet at the scent of water it will bud and bring forth branches..."

The Bible says we're like trees planted by the waters that spread our roots by the river (Jeremiah 17:8). We are told to be rooted and grounded in love (Ephesians 3:17) and rooted and built up in Him, established in the faith (Colossians 2:7). Jesus warned of the danger of springing up quickly, but having no roots, withering away (Matthew 13:6).

Personal Bible study is the best way to sink your roots deeply into the faith. At the beginning of this New Year, make up your mind to read and meditate on God's Word daily. You'll be like a tree planted by rivers of water that brings forth its fruit in season (Psalm 1:3).



## ***New Years Resolution of Good Habits***

*“So I tell you this, and insist on it in the Lord, that you must no longer live as the Gentiles do, in the futility of their thinking.”*

*(Ephesians 4:17 NIV)*



One of the things God does when he saves us is to target the bad habits in our lives. They're not good for us, and some have profound spiritual dimensions, so God wants to see them broken.

Occasionally these negative or bad habits are changed in an instant. There are other times, however, when God has to change things in our lives in order for entrenched habits to be overcome. He has to renew our minds, because we are used to thinking a certain way, and our thoughts may automatically go down old tracks that are not healthy for us.

It isn't enough to get rid of the old habits, however; we also have to begin some new practices. In his letter to the Ephesians, the apostle Paul told them not only to put off their "old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires," but also to "put on the new self"; not only to "put off falsehood," but to "speak truthfully to [their] neighbor" instead; not to steal any longer, but rather to "work so that they may have something to share with those in need."

It is said that it takes about a month or usually forty days or so, to make or break a habit, so as we put these good things into practice, we will gradually see good habits forming – habits such as spending time with the Lord and reading his Word every day.

It goes without saying that we must use wisdom in staying away from former haunts and refraining from watching or listening to things that could reignite old passions. And also to know that in the process, we are on a new journey and that we serve the God who make all things new!

Finally, we know that we can make new resolutions until we're tired of doing so, but nothing is going to change unless Christ is living his life through us; and, thankfully, that is what is promised to every believer. It is not our strength or the power of our traditions that transform us. It is sole the power of Jesus that frees us from our past and launches us into the newness of our futures!

Let's ask the Holy Spirit for the strength to walk in such a way that we are always aware of His presence and power. Let us trust in His renewal to break bad habits and the grace to make new, godly habits that will help us in our walk with the Lord, to the glory of his name.

## ***Protected from the Big and Small***

In May 1995, a 34-year-old construction worker by the name of Randy Reid was doing some final welding on top of a nearly completed water tower in one of Chicago's suburbs. At one point, Randy unhooked his safety belt so he could reach for some pipes. But at that same moment, a metal beam slipped off a nearby crane, and bumped the scaffolding Randy was standing on.



The scaffolding tipped, and Randy lost his balance. He fell 110 feet to the ground below. In landing, he just missed a pile of rocks and construction debris on the ground. Instead he landed face down on a pile of dirt.

A fellow worker saw the whole accident and immediately called 911. When paramedics arrived, they couldn't believe their eyes. They found Randy completely conscious, moving, and complaining that he had a sore back. Even though he went through such a horrendous fall, Randy still maintained his sense of humor. As paramedics carried him on a backboard to the ambulance, Randy asked one thing. He said, "Hey guys, be careful, will you? Don't drop me." When he arrived at the hospital and was examined by the doctors, and they discovered that the only injury he suffered was a bruised lung.

Friends, I think sometimes our faith resembles Randy. God protects us from harm in a 110-foot fall, but we're still nervous about three-foot heights. By that I mean, we have faith that God will save us from hell and death, but we're afraid that He won't be able to protect us from the smaller difficulties we are going to face this coming week.

## ***The World Beyond***

*"He will wipe away every tear from their eyes; and there will no longer be any death; there will no longer be any mourning, or crying, or pain; the first things have passed away." –*

*Revelation 21:4*

In the last work written before he died in 1992, French composer Olivier Messiaen tried to imagine what lay beyond death. The work, called "Illuminations of the Beyond," was the culmination of a lifetime in which Messiaen pondered the things of God.

He described how he often spoke "of faith to atheists." But in this final work, Messiaen tried "simply to imagine what will come to pass." He focused on Jesus, "who will be the light of the resurrected: they will shine with the light of Christ."

In his last interview, he commented, "I imagined myself in front of a curtain, in darkness, apprehensive about what lay beyond: resurrection, eternity, the other life."

A famed musician described the first time he heard this piece in concert. When the music proclaimed, "And God shall wipe away all tears," he "started to weep uncontrollably." The music had such "incredible emotional power."

What the Bible tells us about Heaven should fill our hearts with joy. We can look forward to spending eternity with Jesus in the glorious place He has prepared for us (John 14:3). There, every problem we experience on earth will seem unimportant.

Today, do not be in despair or allow worry or fear to fill your heart. Remember, if you have committed your life to Jesus, you will spend eternity with Him. He will wipe away every tear from your eyes.

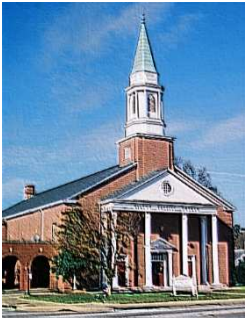
