

God's Miraculous Provision

Why are we surprised when God provides in ways we didn't see coming? The story of the Israelites in the desert is enough proof that God always gives us what we need.

After being delivered from slavery in Egypt and across the Red Sea, Moses gathered the people of God in the desert. They began to complain about what they didn't have.

The multitude of people began to wonder how they could survive in a desert. What would they eat? How could they live? How could they raise families? Maybe they would have been better off back in Egypt, eating leeks and onions by the Nile.

They were focused on the future and thinking about the past, but God was ready to provide for them in the present. While they were worried about the future, God already had provision plans in ways they couldn't imagine.

Exodus 16 records that God provided for His people through manna. Each day God provided enough for them to survive and every day for the next 40 years they had a tangible reminder of God's provision for them. Christians should never doubt that God will bring us what we need at the right time.

God provides through both the miraculous and the mundane. Joshua 5:12 makes clear that God's provision never stops, even as the manna does: "The manna stopped the day after they ate this food from the land; there was no longer any manna for the Israelites, but that year they ate of the produce of Canaan."

The produce of that land was a gift of God just like the manna from heaven. God provides through the miraculous and the mundane, through the normal and the extraordinary.

Every day, God provides for us through ways we don't even notice, and each of those provisions is just as much a means of grace as the others.

No matter what you're facing today, big or small, the Lord will provide. A job that gives steady income is just as much a blessing as a friend bringing a surprise monetary gift right when you need it.

Don't take manna for granted, and don't take the daily blessings of God's provisions for granted either. Ask God to open your eyes not just to see the manna on the ground, but to never lose sight of the ways that he provides for you so abundantly and consistently.



There were two men shipwrecked on this island. The minute they got on to the island one of them started screaming and yelling,


"We're going to die! We're going to die! There's no food! No water! We're going to die!"

Spending Time With Sinners ...

Soon after calling Matthew to follow Him, Jesus ate a meal with "many publicans and sinners" in Matthew's house (Mark 2:15). The scribes and the Pharisees were critical of his actions and complained to his disciples.

In Jesus' day, rabbis were the highest members of Jewish society. Everyone looked up to the Pharisees.

They were strict adherents to the Law and tradition, and they avoided those whom they deemed "sinners" because they had a "clean" image to maintain. Tax collectors, infamous for embezzlement and their cooperation with the hated Romans, definitely fell into the "sinner" category.


As Jesus' ministry grew, so did His popularity among the social outcasts of society. Spending time with the publicans and sinners was part of Jesus' mission: "I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners" (Mark 2:17). If Jesus was to reach the lost, He needed contact with them. He went to where the need was because "it is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick." Praise the Lord, the Great Physician makes house calls!

Sitting at Matthew's dinner table, Jesus may have broken some societal taboos, but His presence there shows that He looked beyond culture to people's hearts. Whereas the Pharisees wrote people off simply because of their profession or their past, Jesus looked past all that and saw their need.

The fact that Jesus saw individuals, not just their labels, no doubt inspired them to know Him better. Jesus didn't let social status or cultural norms dictate His relationships with people. As the Good Shepherd, He sought the lost sheep wherever they had strayed. When Matthew hosted the dinner party, Jesus gladly accepted the invitation. It was a wonderful opportunity to share the good news of the kingdom with those who most needed to hear (see <u>Matthew 4:23</u>). Yes, He would be criticized for His actions, but what prophet ever lived without criticism?

Unlike the Pharisees, Jesus didn't require people to change *before* coming to Him. He sought them out, met them where they were, and extended grace to them in their circumstances. Change would come to those who accepted Christ, but it would be from the inside out. Jesus knew better than anyone else that it is only the goodness and kindness of God leads sinners to repentance (Romans 2:4).

Jesus showed us that we shouldn't let cultural norms dictate whom we evangelize. The sick need a physician. Lost sheep need a shepherd. Are we praying the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into the field (<u>Luke 10:2</u>)?

When we are children and growing up we possess an innocence that as we continue to grow up is lost piece by piece by the negative influences of this world, like fear, and competition, selfishness and greediness. This is the ultimate sin of not becoming the people God created us to be.


We find out that the money, the looks and the ego don't bring happiness to our spirit. Our true journey for inner peace only begins when we decide to follow Jesus Christ. No, I do not mean the socially accepted, substitute form of Christianity casually embraced by so many today. I am referring to the authentic, cross carrying, sacrificial experience of putting Christ first in our lives and priorities.

Every pilgrimage has a final destination. Christians who are authentic about the struggles of this life will also be hungry and authentic about the perfection of the next.

In Lewis's The Great Divorce, travelers from hell step off a bus onto heaven's grass. It is so razor-sharp, so real, that it cuts their tender feet: "The men were as they had always been ... it was the light, the grass, the trees that were different; made of some different substance, so much solider than things in our country that men were ghosts by comparison."

For Christians, our true self is found in Christ, and we are on a pilgrimage to become more like him. As 1 John 3:2 says: "We are now children of God, and what we will be has not yet appeared."

The robber quickly gave up & the lady rang the police.


While handcuffing the criminal, a policeman said, "Gee mate, you gave up pretty easily. How come you gave up so quickly?"

Former Boston Red Sox third baseman Wade Boggs used to hate going to Yankee Stadium, not because of the Yankees, but because of a fan. The guy had a seat close to the field and when the Red Sox were in town he would torment Boggs by shouting obscenities and insults. One day, Boggs decided he'd had enough. He walked directly over to

the man and said, "Hey fella, are you the guy who's always yelling at me?" The man said, "Yeah, it's me. What are you going to do about it?"

During those dark nights when he was troubled, David was to reflect and be still. He could look back and realize the many ways God had blessed him: "You have put gladness in my heart, more than when their grain and new wine abound" (v. 7 NASB).

Trusting in God, he found peace – the peace God promises to all who call on Him. It might not seem that He hears us, but we can be confident in Him. He is with us. We can trust in Him.


